- Work with Pastor Sammie to select appropriate hymns for the Sunday service.

- Provide "special music" for the Sunday services rehearsing midweek with the Song Sisters and the choir.
- Continue to play piano at Sunday services as needed.
- Encourage the congregation in worship through music.

The dates do not go into 2023 because our substitute organist roster ends at the end of December 2022. The organist / music director position can be addressed again in December.

SPRC RESPONSE



THE BOOKS ARE NOW AVAILABLE AT THE CHURCH. YOU MAY PICK UP A COPY FROM THE PASTOR DURING THE WEEK OR SUNDAYS DURING FELLOWSHIP TIME IN BARTLETT HALL. <u>PLEASE COMPLETE</u> THE READINGS FOR THE FIRST SESSION BEFORE WE MEET.

The book represents my own attempts to grapple with questions concerning the nature of scripture and how it should and should not be used in relation to a number of important issues we face today. I know that there are a range of opinions on these matters that are held in good faith by Christians, and I welcome all opinions and questions. My hope is that we can have productive discussions within the bonds of Christian fellowship.

We will meet at 10:00 A.M. in Bartlett Hall, observing the following schedule:

Tuesday, August 30: Introduction and Chapter 1 (pages 1-19)

Tuesday, September 13: Chapters 2-3 (pages 21-30)

Tuesday, September 27: Chapter 4 (pages 51-62)

Tuesday, October 11: Chapter 5 (pages 68-83)

Tuesday, October 25: Chapter 6 (pages 85-101)

Tuesday, November 8: Chapter 7 and Epilogue (pages 103-131)

I look forward to this opportunity for spiritual growth for each of us through serious encounter with scripture and engagement with one another.

STUDY GUIDE FOR SESSION 1 (August 30)

Reading Assignment:

Introduction and Chapter 1 Genesis 1:1-4:16; 6:1-9:28; 11:1-9; 12:1-3 Acts 2:1-15

Revelation 21:1-22:1

AS YOU READ THE ASSIGNMENT, CONSIDER THESE QUESTIONS:

- 1. Do you agree with the contention made in the Introduction (pages 5-6) that the Bible is sometimes used as a tool of abuse and that some uses of it actually abuse the Bible itself? If you agree, can you give personal examples of how you have experienced this abuse? If you do not agree, what are your reasons?
- 2. Chapter 1 describes the overall story that the Bible tells. If you had to give a title to this story, what would it be?
- 3. Do you agree with the statement on page 15 that sometimes people think of divine-human reconciliation too narrowly—that is, in purely individualistic terms?
- 4. Is it accurate to say (pages 15-16) that the kingdom of God has to do with God's rule on earth in the form of peace and justice? Does "Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven" really mean the same thing as "your kingdom come."
- 5. Does the formula "individuality within community" rightly describe the biblical understanding of the relationship between the individual and the community? Do you think that we in the church today have a genuinely biblical understanding of this relationship, or do we lean too far in one direction? What about the larger society in which we live? Does it tend too far in one direction or the other?

God instructs: And let us consider each other to sparking love and good deeds. Don't stop meeting together with other believers.... Instead, encourage each other, especially as the day draws near. Hebrews 10:24-25

And there are other good reasons for in-person worship, such as encouraging our Pastor and making it possible for her to see you and care for your spiritual needs; inspiring others to attend, thereby furthering their spiritual growth; exchanging good-will with those in attendance and brightening their day; sharing information and learning opportunities for being a good neighbor, and most importantly; For when two or three are gathered in my name, I'm there with them. Matthew 18:20




"He put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God. Many will see and fear, and put their trust in the Lord." Psalm 40:3

Nonie Freeman at Children's Time told a true story about a little boy named Mattie Stepanek who was very ill. Despite his hardship of being terminally ill with M.D., he wrote several inspiring books before dying at age 13. One of the books was full of poems named "Heartsongs." Nonie enthusiastically expressed Mattie's inspiring messages, including helping everyone, loving everyone, and living for peace in our world.



Next came Pastor Sammie's superb sermon entitled: "Everything Depends on Us.

Pastor Sammie began with Hebrews Chapter 11, verses 39 and 40, noting that there were many heroes of faith mentioned in earlier verses. "All these people didn't receive what was promised, though they were given approval for their faith. God provided something better for us so they wouldn't be made perfect without us." These heroes of faith, going forward from Abraham and Sarah to the Judges and beyond, acted in accordance with what God would yet do for



them in the future. This gave them the courage to overcome hardship in order to secure God's promises.

Ours, therefore, is a future-looking religion. The significance of what they did and suffered is that they carried on because of being convinced through their faith that things would be better. Likewise, we need to carry on in the same way. Everything depends on us.

Those after us will need to build on what we provide about faith in the promises of God. We need to help them so that "they are made perfect through us." What do I want my church to be? We should, by example, demonstrate our faith even though we may not see the results. "Are we willing to risk being people of faith?" Amen
