WHERE DID CHRISTMAS COME FROM?

We are accustomed to a culture in which birthdays are recorded, remembered, and celebrated, but that wasn't true for the world into which Jesus was born. In those days, there were no birth certificates, and we don't even know how carefully poor people remembered birthdays. In a time with a high rate of infant mortality, it may not even have been a practice to remember the specific day of a child's birth.

That means that the early Christians did not have a clear way to know when Jesus was born. In fact, during the first century of Christian faith, there is no evidence that they commemorated his birth. The first Christian holy days centered on the crucifixion and resurrection. That is why we worship on Sundays, because it was the day of resurrection. Every Sunday, for them, was a celebration of Easter! Eventually, they settled on an annual celebration of the resurrection. The earliest convention seems to have been to set the date of March 25 as Easter. The problem was that March 25 does not always fall on a Sunday, and so eventually the church developed the system we still use to make sure Easter always falls on a Sunday—although that means it is on a different Sunday every year!

In the very early days, Christians turned to the Hebrew scriptures to form their understanding of Jesus. Malachi 4:2 became an important part of that understanding: "But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings." Jesus was identified with the "sun of righteousness." Hippolytus, bishop of Rome in the late second century, believed that March 25 was the day of Jesus' crucifixion, and it was also the spring equinox on

the Julian calendar. This was also regarded as the first day of creation. For that reason, March 28 would have been the fourth day of creation when God created the Sun. An early Christian manuscript from that time reads, "O how admirable and divine is the providence of the Lord, that on that day on which the sun was made on the same day was Christ born...and so rightly did the prophet Malachi say to the people: the sun of righteousness shall rise upon you with healing in his wings." It is possible, then, that the first commemoration of Jesus' birth occurred in late March! However, shortly after that, we find evidence that the nativity was celebrated on December 25. It is likely that this date was derived from the story in the Gospel of Luke.

Luke tells us that John the Baptist was conceived while his father, Zechariah, was performing his priestly duties in the temple. It was assumed that this was during the holy days in the Jewish month of Tishri, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. This would mean that Elizabeth conceived at the Autumnal Equinox. Luke then tells us that Mary conceived Jesus six months later. That would fall on the Spring Equinox. Assuming Mary carried Jesus to full term, he would have been born nine months later on the winter solstice, which, on the Julian calendar, falls on December 25. Sometime in the 200's, this date was chosen and became more and more popular throughout the Christian world. This tradition continues to our own time as we celebrate Jesus' birth together!

- **Prince of Peace.** In a world filled with turmoil, Jesus offers a peace that goes deeper than circumstances, a peace that guards our hearts and minds.


