

A MEAL OF MANY NAMES -Rev. George McClain

Holy Communion offers sustenance, nourishment, and grace for our journey. Something in us hungers mightily to express itself in ritual. The language of ritual helps us express what is inexpressible through mere words. Holy Communion embodies the living presence of the risen Christ among us.

We Christians call this meal by a number of different names. For some, it is the Lord's Supper or the Last Supper, reflecting that it was Jesus who presided at this, his last meal with the disciples. For others it is Holy Communion— "Holy" meaning "of God", "sacred"; and "Communion" meaning "sharing" or "fellowship". Holy Communion literally is a "Sacred Fellowship". The Eastern Church—the Orthodox call it the "Divine Liturgy", indicating its sacred and holy nature as well as its prescribed pattern in the words set forth by people and priest as "the work of the people." And there is the Mass—a celebration as well as mysterious reenactment of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. Many have come to call it the Eucharist—giving thanks to God, not just for the gifts of mercies received, but for the gift of salvation in Christ. By any name, it is the primary act

of worship of the Christian faith. As a sacrament, it is the "outward and visible means to an inward and spiritual grace." In our act of eating bread and drinking wine, Jesus becomes for us the true Living Bread. In the communion liturgy, we say, "It is a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks." Let us come with Joy and give our thanks.

Reader Rev. Desmond Parker CONCERNING THIS SACRAMENT AS IT IS A MEANS OF GRACE: Words from Rev. John Wesley

We often consider this Holy Sacrament as a memorial of the death of Christ, and as a sign of those graces wherewith he sustains and nourishes believing souls. But this is not all, much more is contained in the memorial of representation. This sacrament conveys grace and blessing to the believer. Come to God's altar with a full persuasion that these words, "this is my body" promise more than a symbol, that this Holy Banquet is not a bare memorial only but actually convey many blessings to the receiver... Here then I wait at the Lord's table... Amen, my Lord and my God! Give me all which you show, and grant that may faithfully keep all that you give. Bless your Ordinance and make it an effective means of your grace. Then bless and sanctify my heart also. O, my Father, here I offer up to you my soul; and you offer to me your Son.

Why has Communion, especially the attempts to define Christ's presence been divisive? Our divisions are no more evident than at a table and the people you would eat with and wouldn't eat with. We're smart enough to know that eating is a very intimate activity. You take care whom you invite to dinner. Southern segregationists were smart enough to know they had to keep blacks away from lunch counters, because if you dare ask people to sit down with you, even at a lunch

counter, you've got to admit they're human beings. We also know that barriers are most readily broken at the table. The meal is an intimate, communal, uniting experience, and it's also a risky, scary time when we try to erect boundaries. For Christians, it ought to be a sign of unity. It is a tragedy that of all things this should be mark of division

IN REMEMBRANCE

Russell Pepe (December 11, 1937 -April 4, 2024) died following a valiant struggle with cancer.

Born and raised in East Bridgewater, Massachusetts, Russell attended Colby College in Waterville, where he received the Scholar's Medal in Mathematical Logic and recognition for an undefeated season in wrestling. He continued at Boston University where he received two Masters' degrees majoring in the fields of social ethics, moral philosophy, and theology. One of the highlights of his stay in beautiful Scotland was the opportunity to play the drums for a set of songs by noted jazz singer, Sarah Vaughan.

Following his education, Russell settled in Maine to live and serve United Methodist churches in Cape Porpoise, Gorham, Auburn, Bangor, New Sharon, Farmington, and Bath before retiring in Lewiston. He was happy to have been named Pastor Emeritus of Auburn UMC in recognition of an association of fifty years with the parish. He taught as adjunct faculty at Boston University and at the University of Maine, Portland-Gorham (now the University of Southern Maine), and enjoyed hilting, camping, reading, writing, spook movies, and photography. He kept an extensive collection of Nikon cameras, both digital and film, and enjoyed most using his film cameras to create the black and white negatives that he then developed and printed on siler gelatin paper in his darkrooms, portraits of friends and family being his preferred subjects.

Russell was predeceased by his mother and father; as well as his sister Diane, an accomplished psychiatric nurse; and his son Brian. He is survived by his brothers Richard and Michael Jr., his cousins Judy and Jeannie; his children, Eric and Lisa and her partner Rick, Brian's partner Hannah; and his seven grand and step-grandchildren, Alexander and his wife Kati, Robyn and her partner Kit, Michael, Joey, Morgan, Kayla, and Lily (also known as Alex); and by many wonderful friends.

His ashes will be scattered on a river in Maine to then be carried on its current to the sea and beyond.

A Celebration of Life will be held at the Auburn United Methodist Church, 439 Park Ave., Auburn, on Friday, May 3, 2024, at 11:00 a.m.
