Guidance from John Wesley's Sermons: True Religion and Happiness

John Wesley's Sermons provide a wealth of guidance about faith, hope, and love. "The Complete Sermons "consists of 141 of Wesley's sermons compiled by Thomas Jackson in 1872. The book's jacket notes that "John Wesley's sermons remain timeless classics, demonstrating the theology and faith of the founder of one of the world's largest protestant denominations. He is responsible for 'the establishment of the Methodist Church, and his teaching remains as challenging and poignant today as it was on the day it was first penned." His guidance on religion and happiness follows:

Sermon 114 Excerpts

"If by the grace of God, we have avoided or forsaken all these idols -- *objects of sense; such as gratify one or more of our outward senses; objects of the imagination; things that gratify our fancy, by their grandeur, beauty, or novelty; and what St. John calls, 'the pride of life.' He seems to mean honour, wealth, and whatever directly tends to engender pride.'* -- there is still one more dangerous than all the rest, that is religion. It will easily be conceived, I mean false religion, that is, any religion which does not *imply the giving of the heart to God.* [These are:]

- First a religion of opinions, or what is called orthodoxy.
- Secondly, a religion of forms; of barely outward worship, how constantly soever performed; yea, though we attend the Church Service every day, and the Lord's Supper every Sunday.
- Thirdly, a religion of works; of seeking the favour of God by doing good to men.

• Lastly, a religion of Atheism; that is, every religion whereof God is not laid for the foundation.

"True religion is right tempers towards God and man. It is, in two words, gratitude and benevolence; gratitude to our Creator and supreme Benefactor and benevolence to our fellow creatures. In other words, it is the loving God with all our heart and our neighbor as ourselves.

"It is in consequence of our knowing God loves us that we love him and love our neighbor as ourselves. Gratitude towards our Creator cannot but produce benevolence to our fellow creatures. The love of Christ constrains us, not only to be harmless, to do no ill to our neighbor, but to be useful, to be 'zealous of good works;' 'as we have time, to do good unto all men;' and to be patterns to all of true, genuine morality; of justice, mercy and truth.

"This is religion, and this is happiness, the happiness for which we were made.

"We are happy, first,

- in the consciousness of his favour, which indeed is better than life itself; next,
- in the constant communion with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ; then,
- in all the heavenly tempers which he hath wrought in us by his Spirit; again,
- in the testimony of his Spirit, that all our works please him; and, lastly,
- in the testimony of our own spirits, that 'in simplicity and godly sincerity we have had our conversation in the world.'

"Standing fast in this liberty from sin and sorrow, wherewith Christ hath made them free, real Christians rejoice evermore, 'pray without ceasing, and in everything give thanks.' And their happiness still increases as they 'grow up into the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ.' "Let all; therefore, that desire to please God condescend to be taught of God and take care to walk in that path which God himself hath appointed. Beware of taking half of this religion for the whole, but take both parts of it together. And see that you begin where God himself begins: 'Thou shalt have no other gods before me.' Is not this the first, our Lord himself being the Judge, as well as the great commandment?

"First, therefore, see that ye love God; next, your neighbor, -- every child of man. From this fountain, let every temper, every affection, every passion flow. So shall that 'mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus.' Let all your thoughts, words, and actions spring from this! So shall you' inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the beginning of the world.'"

In *A Long Obedience in the Same Direction*, Eugene H. Peterson maintains that the path to a blessed life is pretty obvious:

Everyone wants to be happy, to be blessed.

Too many people are willfully refusing to pay attention to the One who wills our happiness and ignorantly supposing that the Christian way is a harder way to get what they want than doing it on their own. They are wrong. God's ways and God's presence are where we experience the happiness that lasts.

Peterson concludes those thoughts by quoting Psalm 128:1. Everyone who honors the Lord, who walks in God's ways, is truly happy!

WE REMEMBER, May 30th

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom. We also pray for those who continue serving, especially those in harm's way.
