Pastor Sammie's Thoughts

Advent is Preparing for Christmas

Advent is the season in the Christian year that leads us to Christmas. The first Sunday of Advent is not just the beginning of a new church season but also the start of the new liturgical year. Advent is the link between the old year in the church and the new; it sets the stage for the understanding of Christmas itself.

The word Advent is derived from the Latin for adventus, which means "coming." As a season, it was first observed in the fourth century in France. The season was set at four weeks rather than seven in the sixth century.

Advent is a time of preparing for the birth of Christ and all that comes with the arrival of new life. The liturgical color for Advent is purple- symbolic of waiting, watching, and repenting. Purple has long been the color of royalty; in the later church, it became the color of penitence. Some churches use the color Blue for less of a penitence tone and more of a tone of anticipation.

Whatever color you prefer, the point is that preparation is essential if Christmas is to mean very much more than a rush. Advent mixes anticipation of great joy and the need, equally as strong, of preparation for this joy. Those who do not prepare will probably miss some of the joy. To prepare means to ready our hearts and minds for the celebration of the coming of the One who changes and renews life. We can do that through worship, reading our Bibles, praying, and remembering Christmas is about giving.

CHRISTMAS IS ABOUT GOD'S GIVING-giving to us the great gift of God's self in the form of the Christ child. After all, the commercials of the stores are long gone; the church will stand as the place where we remember Whose Birthday It is and receive the blessing of joy.

"LOVE BEGETS LOVE: LOVE BEGETS STRENGTH"

PASTOR SAMMIE ALL SAINTS' DAY SERMON PREACHED AT HUNTINGTON COMMONS' COMMUNION SERVICE (BUT NOT AT CHURCH ON THE CAPE)

Every time I encounter death, I relearn that EVERYTHING IN LIFE IS AN OPPORTUNITY, AND ALL SAINTS' DAY IS NO EXCEPTION. All Saints' Sunday is an opportunity for several reasons.

It is a time to celebrate not just the great cloud of witnesses, the communion of the saints, but also the relationships that we have had with them. It is a day to render thanks to God for the lives of the dead. And it is a time to confirm the unity of the church on earth and the church in heaven.

All Saints is also a time when the church on earth pauses to ponder how those of us in the living church are to relate to those who have been part of our fellowship in the past and are now separated from us by death and are part of the church triumphant in the afterlife.

It might be helpful for me to share some observations from nearly forty years of ministry. Today is a time for those of you who have deeply loved the departed to think again about where you are, individually, in the grieving process. Many of you, through your own experiences, know that when someone you love dies, your spirit goes through many seasons. There is a season of shock; there is a season of heart-breaking sadness; often, there is a season of anger when all you feel like doing is beating your fists against heaven's door and begging for a little more time. But I also know that there is a season of peace and a season of hope. Of course, these do not come in any orderly fashion. Rather they come jumbled up: one day, you're sure you are going to make it and the next day you're not. One hour your heart is light; the next, it is like an anchor. But over time, and each person's timeline is different, you come to know that it is not in your or anyone's best interest to hold on to death; grief unbearable turns to bearable sorrow. And all of a sudden "letting go" has a new meaning. Camus says it this way: "In the midst of winter, I finally learned that there was in my heat an invincible summer." My way of saying it would be to proclaim that God is the God of the living and the dead, and that in Christ we have obtained an inheritance of love and hope.

To move a little from death and grief is to know that you can trust God's promises as Paul states them in his letter to the Romans. This is chapter 8, verses 38-39: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." And in Romans 14:8, he writes, "If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's."

To move from death and grief is to realize that Jesus makes love the essence of being religious. All Saints is a day to acknowledge the departed and all the gifts they have given to us. It is a time to find consolation in love which does not die with death, but is held eternally in the mind of God. And that is a love that blesses and keeps and encourages you to go on with your life rather than be held back in pain and grief. Because true love not only begets love; it also transmits strength.

On this All Saints' Communion Sunday, let us bring our wounds to the wounded healer. Let us remind ourselves that those we have loved can be remembered with something greater than grief and that love absorbs sorrow. Let us also remember that love transcends despair and joins all mortal and immortal life. And let us be confident that love makes us partakers of God's eternal kingdom. Amen

The journey begins at Advent

When Advent began on November 27 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again.

"Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."



NOVEMBER 13TH ANNUAL CHURCH CONFERENCE

Despite the rain, there was a good turnout for welcoming our New District Superintendent, The Reverenced Arlene Tully, along with her four-legged partner in ministry. Nali is an ADI-certified Facility Dog.



In her appointment to District Superintendent, Rev. Tully noted: "'You know, I've really enjoyed traveling around the district for the past three months getting acquainted with churches, pastors, and laity.

I am especially grateful to those churches that have hosted my meet and greets,' Rev. Tully said. During those sessions, Rev. Tully posed three questions to consider as we envision the future of the Church in the radically transformed landscape of a post-COVID world.

"The questions come from Ronald Heifetz, founder of the Center for Public Leadership at Harvard Kennedy School and coauthor of *The Practice of Adaptive Leadership*.

- 1. What is precious and essential from the past that we need to carry forward?
- 2. What is no longer serviceable and must be discarded?
- 3. What innovations will enable us to carry the best of our history into the future?

"'We are not the first Christians to ask ourselves such questions, Rev. Tully said. In fact, we stand in a long line of religious forebears who found themselves in a time of change or crisis in the world and in the Church.'"

As a congregation, we look forward to Rev. Tully's guidance along with our pastor, Sammie Maxwell.

Rev. Tully was introduced to the congregation by Jean Moulton, and Debora Berry presented her with a gift from the congregation.

living on the Portland streets. Please note that in the preceding photo, Nali has socks in her jaws and is ready for distribution to those in need.

THANK YOU! BEVERLY AND SOCK TAGGERS

Through the continued, productive, and dedicated efforts of Beverly Bangs, the congregation set a new record for giving to the Grace Street Ministry of over \$5,000. Socks accounted for \$1,850, of which \$650 was given by Ocean State Job Lot, and \$3,800 was donated for Dunkin-Donuts gift cards. Each pair of socks and Dunkin-Donuts gift card were tagged with "Love from Church on the Cape, Cape Porpoise, Maine."

THANK YOU LETTER FROM PASTOR JEFF GRACE-STREET MINISTRY

Beverly notes that this is a very long thank you letter, but she promises that you will be happy that you took the time to read it.

Dear wonderful folks at Church on the Cape:

When Beverly contacted me in the middle of last week to arrange a drop-off of socks and Dunkin' cards that you all had so kindly

donated, she said "you'll be pleased." With that simple phrase, my head filled with visions of bags of socks and maybe as many as 40 Dunkin' cards, a very generous gift that would make a big difference in the lives of the unhoused on the streets of Portland.

Imagine my surprise, then, when Beverly arrived yesterday, opened the back of her white SUV, and there were seven large boxes of socks - and not just adequate socks, mind you, but thick wool winter socks, the kind that keeps people's feet warm even when the socks themselves get wet.

I hadn't even finished gawking at this podiatric bounty when Beverly brought out a bag of Dunkin' cards, 380 of them!

I have to tell you; it took the better part of the afternoon to jack my jaw up off of the lawn in front of my house. This is an astonishing, deeply touching and incredibly generous gift. I have been telling folks that some churches would probably donate some Dunkin' cards, but I had no idea that your church alone would collect enough to get us through the bulk of the winter. I actually start giggling when I think of going out on the cold streets today with enough cards for absolutely everyone I meet. I don't believe that has ever happened in the seven years I've been doing this ministry.

There are some who think that giving things to the unhoused creates a transactional relationship that is not helpful. I couldn't disagree more. These simple, but profoundly important objects, bring not only warmth and

respite, but in fact embody the very essence of the Christian message. As Pope Frances says, "You pray for the hungry, then you feed them. This is how prayer works".

As I'm fond of saying, thank you so much for letting me bring your vast and unencumbered love to "the least of these."

The budgeted total, it was noted, is a little less than last year despite much higher inflation. An itemized budget plan is available from the church office.

WORSHIP ATTENDANCE RISES

A Worship Report was also provided in the Church Bulletin. Pastor Sammie Maxwell became our Interim Pastor in July 2022 and was greeted by 75 in-person worshipers and 527 online on July 10. After a superb welcoming, parishioners took a brief break the following Sunday, and from then on, they continued to come back to in-person worship, as the chart on the adjacent column shows.


Currently, in-person attendance averages about 60 each Sunday, and in October, online visitors averaged about 300. (There may be more online viewers when multiple viewers are present at a single site. Moreover, to count as an online viewer, one needs to be on the site for 3 minutes or longer.) Also, attendance at Huntington Commons is around 20.

In total, Church on the Cape regularly provides spiritual guidance to about 400 individuals each Sunday. OUTSTANDING!

Bishop Peggy A. Johnson to serve NEAC

The Northeastern Jurisdiction College of Bishops and Committee on the Episcopacy released the following announcement today:

The Council of Bishops has approved the recommendation from the Northeastern Jurisdictional College of Bishops (COB) and The Committee on the Episcopacy (COE) that Retired Bishop Peggy A. Johnson serve as Interim Bishop for the New England Annual Conference (NEAC) beginning January 1, 2023, through August 31, 2024.

The New England Annual Conference did not receive an assignment or coverage at the conclusion of the 21st Session of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference. Pursuant to Para. 407 of the 2016 Book of Discipline (BOD), the College of Bishops fills vacancies in such circumstances. After consultation with the appropriate stakeholders, the COB and COE agreed that Bishop Johnson possessed the gifts and graces to lead the NEAC during this interim period.

In discussing this scenario with Bishop Johnson, she articulated that she feels called by God to this particular need and is willing to relocate to New England to provide residential leadership, holistic pastoral care and collaborative oversight.

After reviewing the Conference Profile and Cover Page, as well as The New England Declaration (their detailed strategic vision for inclusive mission and ministry), we met with the NEAC Committee on the Episcopacy and the cabinet. We spent considerable time listening to and discussing their needs, priorities and hopes for their next servant leader.

These conference leadership teams agreed upon NEAC's top priorities for their interim servant leader: a) pastoral care and healing; b) a willingness to embrace the vision already cast, while empowering those within the conference to champion its implementation; and c) relationship-building.

Upon hearing this news we became more confident that our discernment was divinely inspired. Bishop Johnson excels in each of these areas. Therefore, we shared our recommendation and Bishop Johnson's name was received with enthusiasm and thanksgiving. These leaders also provided insights that will help position this coverage arrangement for success.

Please pray for Bishop Johnson and Rev. Mary Johnson as they live into this new opportunity. They are excited to serve and look forward to visiting New England soon. We give God thanks for their willingness to offer themselves so quickly after retirement. We thank you in advance for your support.
