

From the Pastor's Desk

I am writing this after an evening of volunteering at Bon Appetit in Biddeford. This church, under the guidance of Kathy Johnson, supports this critical food ministry. On the third Wednesday of each month, we intentionally send a group of volunteers to help provide the meal. Our volunteers can help at any time, but this is our designated monthly commitment. Last night, we served 115 people a nutritious meal, and that was more people than I have seen during my short tenure here.

Feeding is a central theme in scripture. It is used both literally and metaphorically to describe our lives as people faithful to God. The well-known parable of the sheep and the goats from Matthew 25:31-46 is a powerful example of this. When Jesus commends the sheep for their virtuous and faithful living, the very first thing he says is: "I was hungry and you gave me food..." Jesus places feeding the hungry at the top of the list of what it means to be faithful to God's way in this world.


Last night, while volunteers from this church were helping to feed the hungry, the House of Representatives was working to pass a budget bill. The legislation they are moving forward calls for cutting the appropriation for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP or Food Stamps) by about 30% or \$300 billion. It would also reduce federal funding for programs that help to provide food to schools, food banks, and other programs that work to feed the hungry.

In York County, we are experiencing a reduction of services at the York County shelter program, which may well be increasing the demand for programs like Bon Appetit. This church's commitment to that program stands as one of the many examples of how you have embraced Jesus' vision and are seeking to live out your Christian faith. In the present moment, we are already faced with an increased need for our commitment to feed the hungry, and it is hard to predict what will come next and what we will be facing.

The last words that Jesus speaks to the disciples in John's Gospel include this instruction to Peter: "Feed my sheep." We often read this symbolically and think of it as feeding them spiritually, but I'm not convinced that Jesus didn't mean it both ways. Yes, we are called to be a source of spiritual food and sustenance, but John Wesley reminded us that feeding those who are physically hungry is, in fact, a means of grace that also feeds them spiritually and becomes spiritual food for those who do the feeding.

If you have never helped at Bon Appetit, I hope you will take the time to talk to Kathy Johnson or someone from our church who has volunteered there. If you would like to volunteer again, please talk to Kathy. I also urge you to do everything you can to keep the ministry and work of this church strong so that we are able to do our part to be the ones who hear Jesus' voice and feed the sheep.

The Song Sisters Are Always a Pleasure to Hear

The Song Sisters continue to be a delight to hear, and recently, there was a special treat. Susie Goodwin played the autoharp while performing "Unclouded Day" by The Rev. Josiah Kelly Alwood.



A little background from Susie: An autoharp, which is a chorded zither, is a portable stringed instrument. Its popularity in the U.S. as a living room family sing-along instrument was widespread in the early 20th Century. Finding a natural home in Appalachian and folk music, it was most often played upright, strings facing outward, as with the Carter Family. During the Depression and into the 1940s and 50s, teachers frequently used them for music education, especially when no piano was available. I chose my instrument when we spent our winters living aboard a sailboat. I was able to join other sailors

with their guitars, harmonizing as I love to do.

What to Expect

We ask you and your group to arrive promptly at 4:00pm on the day you have signed up for. When you arrive, please parallel park in the street in front of the church. Please enter through the side door next to the driveway next to the church (it connects directly to the kitchen). Depending on what needs to be done, your tasks could include:

- Helping to prepare dinner
- Setting the tables
- Meeting Interesting People
- Refilling drinks
- Having fun
- Serving meals
- Washing dishes
- While the amount of time it takes to serve dinner and clean up varies, volunteers usually leave the kitchen by 6:00pm

LUNCH AND LEARN OPPORTUNITY

Don't miss a great opportunity to learn what Hospice offers besides end-of-life care. The Education Committee is providing the connection for information about all the services Hospice provides!

On June 22. after church with a lovely buffet light lunch, Kimberly Mann, Community Liaison from Hospice of Southern Maine, will present an informative session on all that is available for help if a difficult illness arrives. These include consulting with your physician, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, aide, social worker, chaplain, and volunteers for the patient and the family. Family support is critical!

Palliative care is also very important! You don't need to do it alone!! So often, there is resistance to their services because of preconceived notions about when you should call them.

My experience was so supportive and so needed when my husband was diagnosed with terminal stage four lung cancer 14 years ago. After all treatment had reached the end of being, the solution from a dear friend who had been a volunteer for Hospice said, "Judy, it's time!" The response was immediate, loving, so helpful, and caring. I realize now I should have called sooner. The initial intake was painless and overwhelming as the services were explained. The social worker helped me activate the long-term care policy. The nurse came 3 times weekly to change a drain and check on his vitals. The chaplain spent time with both of us. The aide helped with some daily chores to keep the household operating. The nurse came immediately at the end and stayed until he was admitted to Gosnell House, where I could be a devoted wife and not a caregiver. I thank God for all of them. And amazingly, there was no cost!! Additionally, there is also grief support throughout the illness and up to a year after death.
